## Slovak dial. blikší 'closer', Polish dial. wyrszy 'taller' and their kin: Sound change versus analogy in some irregular Slavic comparatives

Several areas of Slavic attest comparative adjectives with unexpected alternations z > k, s > k, and s > r, unparalleled in the respective languages. Cf. for \*blizъkъ 'close' and \*vysokъ 'high':

So far, the phenomenon has only been referred to vaguely as due to dissimilation or resuffixation (e.g. for Ukr: AUM 1; Hryščenko 1978); furthermore, the facts in the respective languages have been described in isolation. Instead, we offer a principled explanation, arguing that the alternations could arise by analogy to adjectives with root-final velars and rhotics: e.g., for velars, \*dorgb 'dear' > Slk drah (CPV \*dorž-bš- 'dearer' > Slk dial draš-š-, but also restored drah-š- > drak-š-, paving the way for innovative vyk-š- 'taller' alongside inherited vyš-š-). The proposed diachronic mechanism ('analogy between variants') cannot be framed within classical four-part analogy and resembles 'product-oriented innovations' (Bybee & Slobin 1982 etc.), but is more constrained. We attempt a preliminary typological contextualization and explore similar explanations for further unetymological alternations in Slavic.
